# MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



Ms. Azjargal Amarsanaa is originally from Murun, the provincial center of Khuvsgul Aimag. After studying in Ulaanbaatar, she taught English in Khatgal village and later taught Mongolian at the University of Washington as a Foreign Language Teaching Assistant (FLTA) through the Fulbright Program. She has since returned to Khentii Province, where she implemented a Pearson English pilot project, which is now being introduced in public schools throughout Mongolia. At the same time, she worked as an English teacher at the first international boarding school in Berkh, Khentii.

The Mongolian Evaluation Association has received a seed grant for the "Indigenous Evaluation Knowledge Transfer Activities for the Asia Pacific Region" for the 2024-2025 period from the Asia Pacific Evaluation Association. Ms. Azjargal Amarsanaa played a crucial role in collaborating with the Tsaatan community and engaging with younger generations who have migrated to Ulaanbaatar. She has extensive experience as a tour guide in northern Mongolia, particularly in the Darkhad Depression and with the Tsaatan community.

Throughout her career, Ms. Amarsanaa has been involved in various teaching projects across multiple levels of educational institutions. She has identified a significant issue in the education sector in Mongolia: the lack of preparation and evaluation. The pressure and demands placed on teachers can be overwhelming, especially for less experienced young educators. This burden often leads to job dissatisfaction and can result in teachers leaving their positions. She is dedicated to promoting educational equality and accessibility in rural areas through the Mongolian Evaluation Association's topical interest group in Education.
