After intensive academic training of B.A of Business Administration at Mongolia International University and M.A of Economic Analysis at Corvinus University of Budapest, she has pursued a career in the non-profit development sector in multiple fields for international and local organizations/projects, including World Vision International Mongolia, USAID-funded BEST program, and World Bank projects.

<u>Why evaluation field:</u> While projects may appear appealing and worthwhile, it is difficult to know whether they actually achieve their objectives unless data is collected, and an evaluation is conducted. As a result, the most important aspect of the project, evaluation data, provides a deeper understanding of whether, why, and how programs achieve their goals.

Her advice for newcomers: Have a clear vision in the field, Be visible and accessible, Keep learning!

TAKEAWAYS FROM "WHAT MAKES EVALUATIONS INFLUENTIAL? PERSPECTIVES FROM A MULTILATERAL DEVELOPMENT BANK"

All evaluations seek to exert influence via the instrumental, conceptual, or symbolic use of their findings and recommendations. The authors of "What makes evaluations influential? Perspectives from a multilateral development bank" article analyzed seven case studies of selected corporate, thematic, and sector-wide evaluations by the Asian Development Bank's Independent Evaluation Department (IED) to assess influence and identify contributory factors. They found that organizational and external factors, in addition to outreach and communication efforts, may collectively contribute to the influence of evaluations.

Organizational factors

- IED's crucial accountability function at ADB, where it reports to the Board of Directors, set the stage for actions by the rest of the institution based on its evaluations.
- The timeliness of evaluations is a major determinant of the extent of their influence, and the potential for the use and influence of evaluation knowledge is highest when end users receive it when they need it most.
- Clarity on the rationale and underlying principles of evaluations increases the likelihood of their influence, which may extend beyond recommendations.
- IED's engagement with Management and stakeholders increases their receptiveness to evaluations.

External factors

• Evaluation influence is driven by the global development agenda and practices of other multilateral development banks.

Outreach and Communication activities

- IED's communication initiatives can facilitate the conceptual use of evaluations and heighten the awareness of issues by addressing a broad range of stakeholders and end users.
- Collaboration with other evaluation or development agencies on joint publications may expand the opportunities for conceptual and symbolic use.
